Who or what is "Penny Cupcake"?

Penny Cupcake is a pop and R&B singing group based out of Philadelphia. The group consists of three high -school teenagers: Jordan Webber, Ayana Ferguson, and Noelle Smith (not pic-

tured). Penny Cupcake is Philly's Kixx Records, the not the name of any one individual. The group's name was bestowed upon them by accident: when Philly's Big Homie Da O.G. relayed the group's name to a concert promoter, the two had a bad connection, so the promoter never caught their name. When the promoter asked who the group members were, Big Homie said, "Penny, Cupcake, and ..." *The phone disconnected;* that was all the promoter heard: "Penny Cupcake." So, the promoter announced that "Penny Cupcake" would be performing on the show, and the name stuck.

How were they discovered?

The three singers are multitalented entertainers. They all sing and act. The trio will star in the second episode of the criticallyacclaimed indie T.V. pilot "The Kingfish," which begins filming in June. During a script-reading session for the film, Tab thought Jordan and Ayana had tons of charisma and were engaging. So, knowing that the actors were also singers, he asked them to sing a song titled "Don't Forget" that would be featured in the film. He needed a third singer, and knew that another actor,

Noelle Smith, who had a small role in the upcoming episode of the film, is also a singer. He heard her sing and immediately added her to the group.

Where are they from?

Jordan and Noelle attend high school in Philadelphia, where they reside. Ayana lives and attends high school in South Jersey.

Jordan Webber looks familiar. Why?

Jordan was one of the leading actors in episode one of "The Kingfish," where she played the role of 'Cupcake."

Do they have any songs yet?

Yes. The group's first single is titled "Don't Forget" (Kixx Records) and can be heard on their website (www.pennycupcake.com) and YouTube. The song, featuring vocals by Top-10 hit recording artist Josephine Sincere, is about selflove and self-acceptance. It reminds you to love yourself as you are, regardless of what others may say or think about you.

Tab Edwards has worked with many artists over the vears. So what does he think of Penny Cupcake?

According to Tab:

"The first thing that got my attention about each of them was how charming they were. They are down-toearth, all very smart, andbelieve it or not—kinda shy. 
What's next for the trio?

CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATE DONAVAN WEST IS BEST FOR BUSINESS

I'm Donovan West, I've been serving the community for many years, in a number of different capacities, right, I, former president and CEO for the African American Chamber of Commerce. And I'm sure we'll get back to that in terms of talking about the business aspect of it all, but also former CEO of faith based community based organization, People for People, where I was that for over 16 years, certain programs like the pregnant parenting youth program, you know, the urban center, which stood for employment advancement and retention network center, that focus a lot on workforce development, the preschool, the charter school, fatherhood program, renewable

energy, re-entry program, so a ton of different programs and services to serve the whole family, not just a particular individual. And then also, of course, you know, working at ETSI, even back then, I think that's when we first met back in those days, early 2000s, working for the underserved and under employed, you know, community. So why am I running, I'm running because I did a gap analysis, James, and I realized what was missing in city council, and individuals, like myself, were missing individuals who have worked in the field in terms of, you know, from a programming standpoint, but also from an economic inclusion and economic development standpoint, individuals who have that experience and background in both spaces, being able to

actually, you know, represent those voices in City Council. So my goal at the end of the day, is to make sure that those communities are represented as we move forward. And this is a perfect time also, as I was doing that gap analysis, when you start to think about the amount of freshmen and sophomore legislators that will actually be in City Council.

So you said a couple of things that threw me off for a second, right. Renewable energy. You mentioned that. And, you know, with our commercial corridors going through what they're doing, tax is getting higher. PECO, you know, definitely being a private owned company. Now. It's a lot of things, renewable energy is in the future of Philadelphia. Do you think that benefits our local commercial corridors and seniors?

Well, I think the first thing that we need to do, especially as you start talking about our vulnerable populations, is making sure that we leverage our resources that we currently have, the biggest issue that I see is that there's not enough actual application or usage, or should I say, overall leveraging of those resources, so they're there. And often we, you know, we get to certain meetings, and we hear about this wealth of different resources that are available. So I think the first thing we need to focus on is getting them to the actual end user, those who they're intended for, as well as of course, talking about, you know, the the overall process, the process does not need to be so complicated, or even be so restrictive. So I think the first thing we need to do is that and then at the same time, if those same resources can be applied to securing, you know, solar panels, or the installation or things along those lines, it is extremely important that we do an update and upgrade up level those those homes

in different spaces so that we can keep the prices down because it should not be a situation where you as a senior are thinking about where you need to move, especially at that point in your life.

So lets talk about the Chamber of Commerce, my fear is that we're losing individuals who were business focus. I believe City Council was moving more into an activist role. How do you position yourself on council? Will they be receptive to a business person like yourself coming from the chamber?

That's a great question. I

think the first thing we need to do is we need to identify what's important to all of us, what do we have in common? So activist you know, a lot of times we think about an activist, you may think about the things that they are focused on as relates to their heart, right, you know, what their passion is. And from my perspective, obviously, if I'm looking at, you know, getting Philadelphia back to business, and often you'll hear me say that I want us to get back to business, I want us to get focused on, you know, how does this all add up? How does this actually serve all of us? And how do we actually get all of our all of our needs met, but those that are most important, and then we can look at what else we can add to that essential list, if you will? It comes down to again, just focusing on what's important to you, why are you an activist? What's the goal is it quality of life. Okay, so let's talk about your definition of quality life, or let's talk about your definition of safety. We can see what we may have in common, what's important to us, and we may be approaching it differently. I'm a business person, right? Because they may think that's devoid of moral or they may think is devoid of compassion or empathy. No, it's not at all.

ness model, a blueprint for how we want to do certain things. And then also, more importantly, we can be we can appeal to other markets, in terms of what's our UVP what's our unique value proposition in a way that it's going to meet that triple bottom line, right? Not just good for society, but good for that bottom line, because what we have to admit, is that Philadelphia is the biggest business of them all. Right, Philadelphia itself is a big business. If no one wants to come to Philadelphia, it loses money, right? If no one wants to stay in Philadelphia, it loses money. If Philadelphia is a dangerous place to come to, to live to exist, to have fun, it loses money, right? So while you may say, Hey, listen, we need to do X, Y, and Z and you're coming from your heart with it. No problem at all. I think once we sit down, right, and we get away from this emotionally eliciting language and this, you know, things to all this rhetoric that's just to get people hyped, and we sit down, it's okay, no, really, what does that look like to when you talk about these things that you're so passionate about? What does that actually look like? Not just what we just need to do in a broad sense, but what does it actually look like structurally? How is it actually sustainable? Where are we going to get the money from? Right? Let's just have these conversations. And guess what? These questions are annoying to a lot of people I understand, but they still need to be answered.

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
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CULTURALLY CURATED -ARTISTIC RAIN'S MEDIUM

We can all agree that [art] is the most silent but loudest of expressions. Art, like words, has a way of speaking to your soul and channeling your inner thoughts. It can make you feel happy, sad, or inspired. The creation of artworks includes several [mediums], the

question is "What's your style?"

I personally prefer oil and pencil medium based works. In my opinion, pencil is a different dynamic within itself. An artist drawing sketches to recreate a person, place or thing is super dope to me. I can't draw a straight line! It fascinates me literally. My other is oil.

Q. What are your mediums in art and what inspired you?

A. I use acrylic and water-color with fabric to create. My inspiration originally started with drawing pictures from coloring books and painting them. Now my *inspo* is from God, based around my life experiences.

Q. How often do you paint and are there things you don't paint?

A. I try to paint twice per month or if someone is looking for a custom piece. If I'm inspired I may paint 3 -4 times in a week. I also love a challenge; I don't limit the painting.

Q. Can someone buy an original painting, and do you involve yourself with the community?

A. Yes you can, pricing varies of course. I've been involved in several community-based events with Girl Scouts, Juneteenth Celebrations and recently Hancock Middle School to speak to students about black artworks for Black History Month.

Q. Do you have any upcoming projects and have you thought about going pro with your work?

A. Yes, I'm currently working on a poetry and art book which will be released later this year and my goal is to have my works displayed in a few major art museums.

Q. What form of expression

do you believe your art is and why?

A. Art is all types of expressions. It's a feeling for me. I always say everyone is an artist. You can express art in any form. My Mantra is "Visualize and Believe."

Q. Lastly, where do you see your art in the next 3-5 years?

A. A dream of mine is to have my own art gallery. I want a space where I can inspire people, mainly women. My work brings about healing and that's what I would like to offer. I want to be known nationally. God did not give me this gift to only share with the people in my area he wants it to be international.

Freedpeople, Unionists, and members of the 54th Mass., 34th, and 104th U.S. Colored Infantries. The dead were later reinterred in Beaufort.


from His Father, for the first time, to suffer and die the curse of the cross. Our

RECAP by Kaliek Hayes On March 10th and 11th Childhoodslost Theatre group put on A production called Childhoodslost Chronicles; the play focused on Gun violence and its effect on our youth—the play debuted at the Suzanne Roberts Theatre over two days with three shows. The production highlighted the destruction caused by a gun once in the hands of our youth. "Our objective with this production was to seat as many youths as possible with the hopes that young people could see the cause and effect of many choices similar to those in the show, hoping they would make better decisions." In the two days and three

shows, we accommodated 8 Philadelphia schools, three bringing out 7th and 8th students and 5 bringing out 9 through 12th graders. We also had nine different youth groups. We sat approximately 500 plus kids throughout the two days who were utterly engaged in a two-plus hour production; we believe the presentation was successful because the characters looked like them, talked like them, and were dealing with issues they see often; the relatability was crucial to the success of the

We were at or very near capacity for every show. We did not have a single incident with youth in attendance, and we had numerous outpourings about how much they enjoyed the performance. I also have over 75 letters from students expressing how the play made them feel and what they learned. That's roughly 15 percent of our youth audience. Thank you to Shawnette Wilson of FOX 29 News for attending the play and for highlighting our youth.

We plan to bring the production back to the stage on Memorial Day weekend before kids get out for the summer in hopes that it also reinforces a stay-safe summer initiative for kids. Said Kaliek Hayes

I had the pleasure of hosting the Play Childhoods Lost Chronicles, a powerful and



emotional play that deals with the issue of violence in our communities. The play was performed by a talented and dedicated cast of youth actors, and I was truly impressed by their skills and commitment to their roles. From the moment the play started, I was drawn in by the intense and emotional performances of the cast. The story tackled some difficult topics, including death, family issues, and violence, and the young actors handled these themes with maturity and sensitivity.

Throughout the play, I was struck by how well it captured the realities of violence in our communities. The dialogue was raw and honest, and the performances were powerful and moving. It was clear that the young actors had put their hearts and souls into the

production, and the result was a truly memorable and impactful performance. At the end of Childhoodslost Chronicles, the cast gave a Brittany Glover portrait by of Nas to his mother. Sadly, Nas, one of the youth stars, fell victim to gun violence in Philadelphia on March 22, 2022, at the age of 22. Childhoods Lost honored his memory with the painting.
